

CWM Provides Opportunities through Harper College Scholarship Program

CWM's relationship with Harper College began approximately ten years ago when CWM learned of their Manufacturing Technology program. Working closely with their staff, we brought on several students as interns. One of those individuals, Luke Rohrbacher, was invited to stay on at the completion of his internship program, was hired full time, and is now our Traffic & Materials Manager.

We quickly recognized the need to establish an even stronger relationship with Harper College, which led to the creation of the Chicago White Metal Scholarship program, which provides financial support each year to three stu-

Roberto was extremely impressed with everything he saw, and asked many questions throughout the tour. He was particularly intrigued by our automation cells in the CNC and Assembly areas. Harper College also brought along their photographer because Roberto's visit will be documented in a Harper Publication to encourage more driven individuals such as himself to enroll in the Manufacturing Technology program.

While CWM's partnership with Harper started only ten years ago, CWM has always emphasized philanthropy — specifi-

cally through education. When Walter Treiber Sr. came to America from Germany during WWI, he had a limited education. According to Eric, "He always felt that education was very important, and he did not want others to miss out on the formal education that he never received."

That is why Walter Sr. created the Chicago White Metal Charitable Foundation on November 13th, 1961, with the primary focus of supporting advanced education. This emphasis remains the focus that guides the CWM Charitable Foundation today.

HOW CWM UTILIZES TECHNOLOGY & WHAT'S NEXT

The Die Casting industry has seen many technological changes, especially over the last ten years. While CWM may have started with humble beginnings making Slush Castings on the South Side of Chicago, those who know the history of this company understand how far we've come. We strive to have the latest technologies to create the safest working environment possible for our employees — and automation is one of the keys to maintaining those high standards of excellence.

Robots and cobots (collaborative robots) offer flexibility, reliability, and repeatability, to name just a few advantages. As a result, CWM has made robots and cobots a vital component in the Die Casting and CNC processes – and we will continue to do so into the future.

Some of the main reasons for implementing automation to Die Casting and CNC operations are:

• <u>Improved safety:</u> We are looking to reduce heavy lifting or digging deep into bins to retrieve parts. We want to make our employees' jobs safer.

Repeatability: Automation removes human error. With the consistency of a robot or

cobot, we can reduce waste and improve quality.

<u>Less downtime</u>: Investing in robots and cobots reduces downtime and increases our operational efficiency.

Chicago White Metal embraces the need for automation. Just recently, CWM assigned Max Golovin to Director of Automation Technologies. Bill Baraglia, CWM Chief Operating Officer, explained the need for this new position, "A major priority of CWM's strategic planning over the next 5-7 years is to leverage automation technologies as quickly, broadly and, effectively as possible."

Benefits of Automation in Die Casting

One of the most important benefits of automation is efficiency. For example, CWM's CNC Machining department utilizes numerous robots and cobots that can run around the clock, reducing downtime. Robots and cobots also provide a more uniform cycle time, which can help increase efficiency.

CWM is in the process of introducing automation into a high volume assembly cell for ergonomic reasons. During this specific assembly process, numerous tasks need to be completed, some of which include repetitive motions that can be ergonomically unsafe if done incorrectly. This is exactly the type of scenario we want to avoid going forward. Max Golovin and his team are working on automating that assembly process to protect workers and to free them up to perform other activities at the company.

What's Next?

In addition to implementing more automation where it makes sense, CWM will start using Artificial Intelligence (AI) to help reduce any errors that might occur during the die casting process. Al technology can offer rapid and efficient visual inspection of parts to improve consistency. In many cases, it can be difficult or impossible for the naked eye to detect minor defects in parts. Inspection capabilities can also vary from person to person — one person may see something while another person does not. Al brings precision and consistency to the process, ultimately reducing waste and overall inefficiencies.

Over the next few years, CWM will realize significant changes in various departments as a result of advancing technologies. We will see the implementation of more automation, 3D technologies in the trimming process, and Artificial Intelligence. This process starts with extensive research by the automation team, learning what technologies are currently available – and even technologies that are still in the developmental stage – that could be successfully implemented at CWM.

Try these tips from Eric Treiber, CWM President & CEO if you want your turkey to come out of the oven looking perfectly golden brown:

- · Melt butter in a sauce pan with fresh orange juice until it is fully heated
- Remove from heat and let cool for a couple minutes
- Submerge a large piece of cheese cloth which has already been completely unfolded into the mixture
- Soak fully
- Spread over the entire turkey, making sure to cover the legs and wings as well.
- As the turkey cooks, the cheese cloth will become very dark in color and get hard.
