


CWM Celebrates its 85th Anniversary

How it Began

Chicago White Metal Products, Ornamental and Mechanical was founded on October 15, 1937, by Walter G. Treiber Sr. as President and Samuel Gullo as Secretary/ Treasurer. The company began on the south side of Chicago, on the third floor of a loft building — with no elevator — making slush castings. Eventually in the 1940s, we relocated and began making die castings on a Kipp Die Casting Machine — the same one displayed in the CWM lobby today.

Jumping ahead, CWM moved from the south side to the northwest side of Chicago and eventually to our current location in Bensenville. Three generations of the Treiber family have led CWM, and their commitment to the business remains stronger than ever.

Significance of Reaching the 85-Year Milestone

Turning 85 is a notable event in the business world — especially since, according to the Small Business Administration (SBA), just 80% of small businesses survive the first year. That might seem like a high number, but it drops sharply afterward.

Only half of small businesses survive past the five-year mark. Of those, one in three will make it to 10 years; according to the US Census Bureau, only 12% of all businesses make it past 26 years. So to put that in perspective, CWM has beaten the odds considerably thanks to years of steady leadership.

On October 15, let us all reflect on what CWM has accomplished over the past 85 years, and look forward to many more prosperous years to come!

Benefits of High-Volume Production

What is High-Volume Production?

While the phrase "high-volume production" can refer to any manufacturing process, die casting is one of the most common methods where this form of production is utilized. At CWM, we cast Aluminum, Magnesium, and Zinc parts. Those alloys are strong, durable, 100% recyclable, & have excellent mechanical properties. That makes them an ideal choice for high-volume production using hot chamber and cold chamber die casting.

At Chicago White Metal, we also incorporate automation into our manufacturing processes to help increase production. Our Die Cast machines are equipped to produce a large number of nearly net-shaped parts in a short amount of time. Our CNC machines are also set up to be automated — this allows us to machine parts with tremendous accuracy.

Benefits

Perhaps one of the most significant benefits of high-volume production is the lowered costs. As the volume of production rises, cost per piece often goes down. Also, when a part is made in large volumes, we are able to produce parts more efficiently — automation is a big part of this process.

In addition to the cost savings, high-volume production is the fastest way to turn around a large order of parts or products. This means the customer gets their product to market faster, allowing their organization to stay on the leading edge of innovation. In a competitive economy where companies are continually introducing new items, the time and money saved with high-volume production can set an organization up for success.

Considerations

High-volume die casting typically involves the introduction of automation, which offers many benefits: repeatability, higher quality, and lower (and more predictable) long-term costs of operation. However, successfully scaling to high-volume manufacturing requires foresight and planning to streamline the production process and minimize changes.

Parts must be designed to be manufactured efficiently over the entire die lifecycle. After the process has been established, there are many opportunities to continue learning and improving. That requires involving the entire team, from engineers to machine operators; each brings a unique perspective. And with high-volume production, even a tiny improvement in cost or efficiency can be significant.

One of the main reasons CWM maintains such a rigorous recycling program is due in large part to employee dedication. The recycling program has expanded year-to-year thanks to Senior Management's commitment to excellence in all aspects of the business, especially when it comes to environmentalism.



Recently, Tom Mrock, CWM's New Product Finishing Manager, took the time to meet with all CWM employees to refresh them on what is and isn't appropriate for recycling. Tom also educated everyone about "Plastic Free July," which CWM looks forward to participating in this year. Small steps like that can make a big difference in protecting the environment and maintaining our reputation as an industry leader.

CWM's New Styrofoam Recycling Program Off to a Great Start

Chicago White Metal recently enacted a Styrofoam recycling program that kicked off with a bang in June, when over 20 lbs. (pictured right) of the difficult-to-recycle material was taken to a designated recycling center in the western suburbs of Chicago.



Most residential recycling services do not accept Styrofoam; therefore, it typically ends up in landfills, which is most unfortunate. However, as is the case with most things CWM does when it comes to the environment, we went above and beyond and found a recycler that does in fact recycle Styrofoam.

CWM sends our Styrofoam to the recycling center where it is ground up and processed into small bricks, similar to ingots. They are then sold and used in many industries to make new products — like picture frames, RV panels, and even home insulation. Even products made with recycled Styrofoam can be recycled again, resulting in a closed-loop recycling system.

Importance of Recycling Styrofoam

Styrofoam is a plastic product, which means that manufacturing new Styrofoam products uses non-renewable fossil fuel resources. In addition, because it's a plastic, it degrades slowly — it can take up to 500 years to decompose. This material is not only filling up our landfills, but it's also affecting the environment — especially the oceans.

Styrofoam is lightweight and it accounts for just 0.01 percent of our household waste. However, the volume over time that is going into our landfills causes them to fill with a product that lasts for centuries — so any amount recycled helps.

Styrofoam Collection at CWM

Styrofoam collection containers (pictured right) are located in both cafeterias at CWM. All associates working at CWM are encouraged to bring in their clean Styrofoam packaging waste (e.g., food and pharmaceutical shipping coolers, electronics/TV/furniture packaging — no peanuts) to keep them out of landfills. On the first Saturday of every month, it is taken to a Styrofoam recycling center.


